
PSALMS 1-2

THE BOOK OF PSALMS

- The original readers: Those living when there is no King in Israel.
- The big message: The King is coming!



He said to them, 'This is what I told you while I was still with you: everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in **the Law of Moses**, **the Prophets** and **the Psalms**.'

Then he opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. - Luke 24:44-45

- The prayers in the Psalms show us what the people believed.

- "The Psalter was created and presented to Israel as an anthology that was intended to be memorised for the enculturation of the youth."

- The general storyline: Rebellion against God, God installing his King, judgement, refuge.
